

They believed that wealth was God's gift to the pious.

Wealth was a man's goal in life.

Wealthy people deserved respect.

Poor were on the bottom of society.

Who is the Rich Young Ruler before he encounters Jesus?




Rich, Young, and Rules over something





The Parable

In the 12th century, King Richard I of England left to fight the Crusades. While gone, his brother sought claim to the throne and got the support of Bishop of Litchfield. On returning, the king pardoned the Bishop with the condition he rebuild the cathedral which stands today.



In our Bible story, upon the return, the king will NOT pardon the disloyal. Jesus is very firm that judgement will come to the disloyal or the rejectors.



Group #1: The Rejectors

"But his subjects hated him and sent a delegation after him to say, 'We don't want this man to be our king.' Luke 19:14 NIV

Historically, there was a situation that the people would recognize. Herod died in 4 BC. Two of his sons (Antipas and Archelaus) went to Rome to lobby to become king. Rome had to approve someone being called king. There was a Jewish delegation that followed Archelaus to lobby against him becoming king because he was so bad. So, title was refused him.

Scripturally, Jesus is saying that not everyone will be working for Jesus or looking forward to his return. In fact, there will be Jewish leaders who don't want him king and will show their antagonism in the coming days in Jerusalem.

Their reward isn't rest, but more opportunities to serve.

Group #3 Third Servant

Critical of his King
Chooses to do nothing out of his fear
Chooses not to make good use of his gift
Does not have faith or trust in the King
Has an attitude problem

Group #4
Other 7 Servants

We don't know what happened to them.

How do you look at money?

EXPLORE YOUR PRIORITIES

- -Is acquiring lots of money wrong? No, if its done legally.
- -Is having wealth wrong? No, not necessarily.
- -Is loving wealth above all wrong? Yes. For the love of money is a root of all kinds of evil. Some people, eager for money, have wandered from the faith and pierced themselves with many griefs. I Timothy 6:10.
- -Where does money and possessions rank in your list of priorities? Where does it rank in your heart?



How do you look at money?

CONSIDER HOW YOUR MONEY IS USED

- -Does your money provide for your needs (food, clothing, shelter) and maybe some of your wants?
- -Does your money provide for the needs of others, your neighbors both near and far?
- -How are you investing your money in furthering the Kingdom of God?

AIM FOR GENEROSITY

- -We are the stewards of all God's gifts.

 Each of you should use whatever gift you have received to serve others, as faithful stewards of God's grace in its various forms. 1 Peter 4:10
- -Live out your faith.
- -Make good choices.
- -You need to consider your time and talents in addition to your treasure when you aim for generosity.
