







- Esther, (Hadassah)


 a beautiful young

- Mordecai, her cousin, who raised her as his own daughter.






The villain of the story is Haman, an arrogant, egotistical Amalekite, who was advisor to the king.

Mercy vs Disobedience

Who is Mordecai?

Esther 2:5

Now in Shushan the palace there was a certain Jew; whose name was Mordecai, the son of Jair, the son of Shimei, the son of Kish, a Benjamite.

II Samuel 16:5-12

Shimei was a descendent of Saul. He was the one cursing David and throwing rocks at him when David was fleeing Jerusalem. David's men wanted to kill him but David said no. When Absalom was defeated and David returned to Jerusalem, Shimei was the first one to greet him and was pleading and repenting for his life. Again, David's men wanted to kill him but David showed mercy and said no again.

Mordecai is descended from a man (Shimei) who David showed mercy to. David's mercy, 500 years later, produced a hero for Israel in Shushan.

Who was Haman?

Esther 3:10

The king took his signet ring from his hand and gave it to Haman the son of Hammedatha the Agagite, the enemy of the Jews.

An Agagite is from the lineage of King Agag, the king of the Amalekites.

Samuel said to Saul....

"This is what the Lord Almighty says:

I will punish the Amalekites for what they did to Israel when they waylaid them as they came up from Egypt.

Now go, attack the Amalekites and totally destroy everything that belongs to them. Do not spare them: put to death men and women, children and infants, cattle and sheep, camels and donkeys"...

Then Saul attacked the Amalekites all the way from Havilah to Shur, to the east of Egypt. He took Agag, king of the Amalekites alive, and all his people he totally destroyed with the sword.

But Saul and the army spared Agag and the best sheep and cattle, the fat cows and lambs—everything that was good.

These they were unwilling to destroy completely, but everything that was despised and weak they totally destroyed.

When Samuel reached him,
Saul said, "The LORD bless you! I have carried out the
LORD's instructions."

But Samuel said, "What then is this bleating of sheep in my ears? What is this lowing of cattle I hear?"

Saul answered, "The soldiers brought them from the Amalekites; they spared the best of the sheep and cattle to sacrifice to the LORD your God, but we totally destroyed the rest."....

But Samuel replied: "Does the LORD delight in burnt offerings and sacrifices as much as in obeying the voice of the LORD?

To obey is better than sacrifice, and to heed is better than fat rams. For rebellion is like the sin of divination, and arrogance like the evil of idolatry. Because you have rejected the word of the LORD, he has rejected you as king."

...And Samuel *hewed* Agag in pieces before the Lord in Gilgal.

1 Samuel 15:1-23 and verse 33

Saul's disobedience allowed Haman to be born 500 years later, who was still bent on destroying the Jews.







Where is Messiah in Purim?





It is about deliverance –

- God delivered Esther and her people.
- God gave us the greatest deliverer Messiah Yeshua
 Jesus Christ
- And you shall call his name Immanuel God is with us.
- •He will deliver his people from their sins.

 He will deliver ALL people who put their trust in him.

It is about obedience-


- Abraham and his decision to trust God and obey his commands, produced (and still is producing) multitudes more numerous than the sand.
- •Rahab and Ruth, both Gentiles, sided with God and 400 years later, came King David.
- Yeshua's obedience to the cross is still bringing eternal life to us 2000 years later.

So in conclusion:

- •The Book of Esther does not mention God. But he is woven in the background.
- •Our actions impact not just the immediate moment or the here and now; but our actions can have everlasting consequences.

David's mercy on Shimei produced a hero for Israel, Mordecai 500 years later. Saul's disobedience produced a destroyer of Israel, Haman, 500 years later.

- •It's ok to ask people to pray with you and for you.
- •God is the God of redemption. We have been redeemed and bought with a price by Jesus Christ.
